Tamil Nadu CM says Sterlite will be shut; power supply cut

TNPCB orders closure after finding the unit was preparing to resume production

Tamil Nadu Chief Minister Edappadi K. Palaniswami said on Thursday that the State government was taking all steps legally to permanently close down Sterlite Copper, a Vedanta Group company, in Thoothukudi.

Thirteen persons were killed in police firing during the protests against the plant.

Earlier in the day, the Tamil Nadu Pollution Control Board (TNPCB) ordered the closure of the Sterlite Copper unit with immediate effect and disconnected electricity supply to the plant at 5.15 a.m.

"This government is Amma's [Jayalalithaa's] government that respects the sentiments of the people. As far as the Sterlite issue is concerned, this Amma's government is taking steps legally to close down the unit," Mr. Palaniswami told journalists at the Secretariat.

His statement came soon after Opposition leader M.K. Stalin staged a dharna outside the Chief Minister's

chamber. Mr. Stalin, who was physically removed from the Secretariat premises and detained till the evening, alleged that the Sterlite Group had bribed the government.

TNPCB inspections

In its order, the TNPCB said that during inspections by its officials on May 18 and 19, it was found that "the unit was carrying out activities to resume its production operations" though permission

was not granted.

Following this, the Joint Chief Environmental Engineer, Tirunelveli, recommended disconnection of electricity supply to the plant under Section 33A of the Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974, and Section 31A of the Air (Prevention and Control of Pollution)Act, 1981.

Trump calls off summit with Kim

Cites his open hostility in remarks

WASHINGTON

Trump on Thursday called off his June 12 meeting with North Korean leader Kim Jong-un, which was to take place in Singapore.

Trump wrote: "...based on the tremendous anger and open hostility displayed in your most recent statement, I feel it is inappropriate, at this time, to have this longplanned meeting."

"I was very much looking forward to being there with you," the President said in his letter, which was released by the White House.

In a dramatic turnaround in March, Mr. Trump accepted Mr. Kim's offer for a summit, conveyed through South Korean interlocutors. After months of diatribe and threats, Mr. Trump and Mr. Kim appeared willing to negotiate denuclearisation of the Korean peninsula, but the initiative began to unra-

Fitness contest turns into 'fuel challenge'

Opposition leaders give a political twist to BJP Minister's video selfie campaign

In the fraught ecosystem of social media, it would appear that even something as innocuous as a motivational fitness video is not immune to the daily cut-and-thrust between political adversaries.

Hours after Prime Minister Narendra Modi accepted the fitness challenge from the Indian cricket captain Virat Kohli, Opposition leaders, including Congress president Rahul Gandhi, tweaked the viral social media campaign to throw up their own version of a political challenge for the Modi government.

Using the hashtag #FuelChallenge and tagging captain Kohli, Mr. Gandhi a fitness enthusiast himself

original fitness challenge started by Sports Minister Rajyavardhan Rathore last Tuesday. Posting a 33second video where he is seen doing push-ups in his office, Mr. Rathore invited actor Hrithik Roshan, badminton star Saina Nehwal and Kohli to join in and post their videos.

The cricketer accepted and, in turn, invited his wife and Bollywood star Anushka Sharma, the Prime Minister,
